<b>Essential Questions</b>	What skills do we need in order to read? What is the role of religion in society? How does colonization affect indigenous populations?				
<b>Major Skills</b>	Students continue to read Latin prose of increasing complexity, particularly of elements governed by the infinitive. Students will encounter increased incidence of the perfect passive participle, prepositional phrases plus a participle, the partitive genitive, neuter plurals, along with increased incidences of the verbs <i>debeo</i> , <i>volo</i> , and <i>iubeo</i> with the infinitive.	Students read perfect participles (active, deponent), clauses with <i>cui</i> , and more occurrences of the descriptive genitive.	Students find increased incidences of neuter plurals, and the 4 <sup>th</sup> declension neuter noun, <i>genu</i> , and <i>idem</i> .	Students read <i>cum</i> clauses containing 3 <sup>rd</sup> person, singular and plural, pluperfect and imperfect subjunctive verbs, including <i>sum</i> , <i>possum</i> , <i>volo</i> . Students will encounter the neuter gerundive of obligation.	Students read indirect questions using 1 <sup>st</sup> and 2 <sup>nd</sup> person, singular and plural verbs, of the imperfect and pluperfect subjunctive. Students will read perfect participles (active, deponent), in the accusative case, clauses with <i>cuius</i> , dative participles, and the 3 <sup>rd</sup> person, singular and plural, of the pluperfect passive.

<b>Essential Questions</b>	What skills do we need in order to read? What is the role of religion in society? How does colonization affect indigenous populations?			
<b>Major Skills</b>	Students read purpose clauses, along with increased incidences of the neuter gerundive of obligation, and impersonal verbs. Expressions of time are introduced in the reading, along with <i>num</i> + indirect questions, <i>id quod</i> , <i>ea quae</i> , dative + participle, future participles, and the use of the present tense to indicate action begun in the past and continuing into the present.	Students will read indirect commands, result clauses, with increased incidences of impersonal verbs, and extended prepositional phrases + participle.	Students read nouns, pronouns, and adjective in the ablative case, along with uses with the perfect passive participle. Students encounter connecting relatives and increased usage of expressions of time.	Students read 3 <sup>rd</sup> person singular and plural, present and imperfect passive verbs and purpose clauses with <i>qui</i> and <i>ubi</i> . Purpose clauses and indirect commands with <i>ne</i> . They also will encounter ablatives + the verb, adjectival <i>is</i> , <i>dum</i> + present indicative, and the ablative absolute without a preposition.
